

sh Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent, a 40-day period, excluding Sundays, that leads up to the joyous celebration of Easter. It is a day distinguished by the solemn ritual of placing ashes on the foreheads of the faithful, symbolizing mortality, repentance and humility. This year it fell on Wednesday, March 5. Christians of all ages, religions, and personal standings in the church gathered to receive a cross of ashes on their foreheads. The ashes, made from the burned palms of the previous year's Palm Sunday, serve as a poignant or emotional reminder of the biblical phrase "For dust you are, and to dust you shall return," *Genesis 3:19*. This humbling ritual encourages introspection, fasting, and prayer, deepening faith and nurturing spiritual growth.

Pastor Cooper commenced the Ash Wednesday service with a prayer, invoking God's presence and expressing gratitude. He acknowledged the somberness of the occasion and encouraged humility, prayer, and reflection on God's greatness during Lent. He prayed for the season to transform lives and bring blessings and favor. The Word for the hour began with a declaration that Lent is a sacred season of spiritual transformation, calling individuals to engage deeply in reflection, repentance, renewal, and restoration as they draw closer to God. It is a time to evaluate one's relationship with Him, guided by moments of fasting, prayer, and self-denial. As Psalm 139:23-24 beautifully expresses, "Search me, O God, and know my heart; test me and know my anxious thoughts." This period is meant for introspection—an honest look at attitudes, actions, and priorities, with an openness to God's revealing presence. During Lent, repentance means intentionally turning away from sin and embracing a life aligned with God's will. It involves a radical shift in mindset and behavior, releasing burdens and habits that hinder spiritual growth. Repentance is a commitment to seek God's approval, trusting His grace, mercy, and readiness to forgive. Lent also serves as a time of renewal, where believers are invited to embrace the transforming grace of God. The ashes received during this season remind us of our human frailty, yet they also symbolize hope—the promise of new life through Christ's death and resurrection. This renewal is both a personal and spiritual awakening, inspiring believers to turn toward God's presence and experience profound transformation through His love and grace. Lastly, Pastor Cooper declared Lent a season of restoration, where God's power renews the spirit and brings joy, peace, and hope to those who seek Him. Even in failure or disobedience, His corrective hand forgives and restores us to blessings. God's restoration transcends loss, offering healing and renewal to those who trust in Him. Lent cleanses the mind, shifts perspectives, and helps us emerge from trials with renewed purpose and faith. Through reflection, repentance, renewal, and restoration, it challenges believers to deepen their connection with God and emerge transformed and grateful for His love.

At the close of the service, Pastor Cooper, assisted by Rev. Rosemary Morris, marked each congregant's forehead with a cross of ashes. After the Imposition of Ashes, Pastor Cooper's prayer and Benediction concluded the service, and the reflective assembly departed in silence, spiritually renewed and blessed.



The Resurrection: JESUS' VICTORY OVER DEATH

RESURRECTION or **EASTER SUNDAY** is a time to celebrate the *life, death, resurrection of Jesus Christ*, and to remember the power of God's grace and mercy. It is the holiest day and considered the central tenet or belief of the Christian faith. It signifies the triumph over death, and the promise of eternal life for believers, representing *hope* and *new beginnings* through Jesus' victory over the grave. Thus, as Christians, we celebrate the confirmation of our faith; our God is alive and true; and our salvation, by His hands, is secure. The miraculous lesson of Easter is that through Jesus' death on the Cross, we, as Christians have been granted a second chance.

Holy Week began on *Palm Sunday*, April 6, including *Ash Wednesday*, *Maundy Thursday*, *Good Friday* and ended on *Easter Sunday*. It was a week of worshipful worship, fervent prayer, insightful study, individual reflections, and needed repentance.

On April 18, **Good Friday** service was hosted by the Sixth Mt. Zion Baptist Church - the Rev. Tyrone Nelson, Pastor. Seven former presidents of the Baptist Ministers' Conference of Richmond and Vicinity were invited to deliver the *Seven Last Expressions of Christ* before His Crucifixion and His death. Our own Pastor, the Rev. Dr. Roscoe D. Cooper III, delivered the seventh Word, employing the Gospel according to *Luke 23:46*, "Father, into thy hands I commend my Spirit." And when Jesus had said this, He breathed His last. Pastor Cooper's poignant points were: a) Jesus called on His Father because of His power, presence, and peace. b) Our Father is the Source of Life and the only One that can get us through our situations. c) Often times, just like the disciples, the ones closest to us, hurt us the most. d) As believers, we must hold on to God's commands, mercy, justice, integrity, and His hand. e) You can get what God has for you only when you let go and give it to Him. f) Jesus released His life and put it in His Father's hands. g) On Good Friday Jesus rested for three days only to pick up His life again early Sunday morning. Cementing the belief, the Father has the last Word over all things! The anointed veteran ministers proclaimed "The Last Seven Expressions of Christ" with mighty, liberating, and persuasive energy and the day was undeniably blessed!

The Zion church worshipers eagerly gathered on Resurrection Sunday, April 20, to glorify the Risen Savior, praise God for the gift of Salvation, show our gratitude for God, and to be blessed by the preached Word! The preamble to the preached Word was a rhythmic Praise Dance exhibition, fervent prayers, and gospel songs by the Mass Choir. The opening joy replaced the grief in the hearts and minds of the congregants and reminded us that "HE IS RISEN!" Pastor Cooper crowned the morning with his noteworthy sermon, chose his scripture, Luke 24:7 and entitled his sermon, "It Must Happen." Pastor stated that Jesus was betrayed, and knew that He had to suffer, die and rise while living out God's plan, sandwiched by destiny, necessity, and urgency. We, too, must suffer, go through things, rise up from our troubles, and believe in our God when the storms are raging in our life, not just when the sun shines brightly. We serve a God that exceeds our needs, blesses us with left-overs to bless someone else, and keeps His promises. "He rose proves the perception." Like those who didn't believe the women, some must see to believe because their faith is not strong. Therefore, we must praise our Savior for what He has done, is doing and shall do. Stop doubting---God will show us! We can count on His Word because He promises and He fulfills! The church received 13 candidates via Baptism and/or Christian Discipleship—A God-favored day indeed!

The evenings of April 28 – 29, the Henrico Ministers' Conference and Vicinity presented two days of power-packed County-Wide Revival, hosted by the Rev. Dr. Roscoe D. Cooper III, Pastor of the Rising Mt. Zion Baptist Church, and members of its ministries. Several HMCV clergy and guest clergy ministered or served as a participant on the program. The Ministry of Music was offered by *Unified Praise* and the HMCV President, the Rev. Dr. Zynora D. Manson extended a heartfelt appreciation to Pastor Cooper, the Zion church family/ministries, and



gave the Benediction both nights.

In spite of the jubilation of the devotional period, the congregants patiently awaited the highlight of the evening, the Preached Word! When the Rev. Dr. Kevin L. Sykes,

Pastor of the St. James Baptist Church stood, the accolades, shouts, applause, and standing ovations didn't stop until he praised his way back to his seat. He chose the scripture reading, Genesis 1:1-5 and entitled his sermon, "God Is Not Afraid of the Dark." Dr. Sykes cited the following poignant points: a) People of God, trust in the Lord – the God of Creation is the God of Light. b) The world was dark, dismal, gloomy, and depressing and God said, "Let there be light" and there was light. c)



Justice serves some, but not all—darkness! d) Students are in a quandary—darkness! e) World friends are vanishing--darkness! f) We've all had dark moments and need some light in our life-Seek God, trust Him, wait on Him, listen to His voice because He's not afraid of the dark! g) Don't worry--God will never abandon us. Dr. Sykes emphasized that "Darkness" has benefits—It helps us to realize our limitations. It has a lasting impact on what we've been through. Lastly, it forces us to reach out to God. In summary, Dr. Sykes stated how we can handle dark moments: 1. Know that God orders your steps. 2. Allow His presence to invade your dark moments. 3. Standup and say God is your life, fortress, your Lord. 4. Hold to God's unchanging hand. 5. Increase your faith. 6. Trust Him for His grace. 7. Have confidence that God will see you through---JESUS IS THE LIGHT, without Him you are living in darkness! DARKNESS cannot exist in the same space with HIS LIGHT!

Tuesday night the *Richmond/Goochland GMWA* provided the Ministry of Music and the Trinity Baptist Church Ushers served. The Rev. Dr. A. Lincoln James, Jr., Pastor of the Trinity Baptist Church, was the evangelist who chose the scriptural text, John 5:2-4, and named his sermon, "Bethesda." The term, Bethesda, means a House of Mercy. This seasoned servant of the Gospel stated that many churches are everything but a House of Mercy. Instead, too many churches are houses of augmentation, gossip, fighting, fussing, one member against another-Everything but what God wants. In Jerusalem, there's a pool in the Hebrew language called, Bethesda, which is surrounded by five porches or colonnades. It's a place where a

multitude of impotent, powerless, disabled folk such as the blind, lame, and paralyzed lie, waiting for years for someone to help them get in the moving water to be healed. Dr. James stated that the disabled folk are not physically disabled but spiritually disabled. God wants the church to be about His business, more kind, more loving, more forgiving, more helpful, more thankful, more service, more peace, more faith, and less complaining, less jealousy, less critical, less rebellion, Two blessed and anointed evenings for sure! and less doubting!

Thank the Lord for grace and mercy bestowed upon the Spratley Allen Missionary Circles as its members continue to assist those in need. We are so grateful and appreciative for our past President, Sister Pauline Holmes, who now serves as the Vice-President, and we pray for God's blessings upon our new president, Deacon Renita Thornton, as we continue to do God's Will in missions. In addition to the offering of prayers to the bereaved, sick and shut-in, and providing monetary and gift card donations to persons in need, we are also embarking upon a few other ministry outreach projects.

One of the community outreach projects was to assist several of the VCU Massey Cancer Center patients. The missionaries chose to provide monetary gift cards, socks, lip balm, mirrors, tissues, nail clippers, healing journals, and healing prayer cards to several men and women who are battling cancer and are patients at the center. The VCU Massey Cancer Center is one of two National Cancer Institutes designated Comprehensive Centers in Virginia with a community–centric approach to a future without cancer.

Another major community outreach project was to help provide food for the families who are affiliated with the Ronald McDonald House. This establishment is an independent, non-profit chapter of the Ronald McDonald House Charities that provide a "home-away-from-home" for families with children receiving care at local area hospitals throughout the Richmond region. The RMHC keeps families with sick children together and close to the medical care their child needs by providing a temporary place to stay, a sibling center, hospitality cart and lunches with love programs. The Spratley Allen missionaries purchased and delivered breakfast food items to the, and remain prayerful for the children and their families.

The Fifth Sunday of March was celebrated as Missions Sunday at Rising Mt. Zion morning worship hour during which the Spratley Allen missionaries gathered as a group adorned in black and wearing an Area A-District 1 red corsage. To God be the glory!

The missionaries continue to participate in the Baptist General Convention Women's Ministry District I Area A programs and events as well as the state BGC Women's Ministry meetings and programs. The state quarterly meeting was held March 15 at the state BGC office on Graham Road. Women's Ministry President, Sister Barbara Coleman-Brown and officers are continuing to hold Area workshops throughout the state. Monthly prayer calls are held each third Monday at 7 a.m. Members are looking forward to the Hybrid 125th BGC Annual Session and Congress of Christian Faith Formation to be held in Roanoke, June 2025.

The Black Experience in Richmond, Virginia

An intriguing and Informative Tour of Landmarks and Cultural Insights in the River City

Believing in celebrating Black History year-round, many members of the Rising Mt. Zion Baptist Church, including our Pastor, the Rev. Dr. Roscoe Cooper III and First Lady Candice Cooper, were delighted and eager to tour several African American historical landmarks in Richmond VA on March 1. The RMZ Black History Ministry did an amazing job in planning and implementing this event with the expert assistance and tour guide, Sister Robinette Cross of Cross-Cultural Talks, LLC.

The Richmond tour began at the Black History Museum and Cultural Center of Virginia, located on



Leigh Street. This historical building was once a part of the Benjamin A. Graves Junior High School where our own Trustee Murley Richardson, Brother Douglas McBee, and others attended Physical Education and Health classes many years ago. The two-story museum features a tall statue of the famous Richmond-born/reared Black American tennis player, Arthur Ashe, Jr. for which several edifices are named in his honor. In the game of tennis, he won several Grand Slam titles, was selected to the United States Davis Cup team, and the only Black man ever to win the singles titles at Wimbledon.

Each room in the center displayed historical Black artifacts, culture and archives. The galleries featured digitally enhanced exhibitions, a multi-paneled touch screen and an interactive timeline of Black history. In the medicinal section of the museum were exhibits of Black physicians, optometrists and chiropractors that explored the profound impact of Black medical professionals who not only treated patients, but also became educators, civil rights activists and leaders in public health. In the 1863 era, Dr. Alexander Thomas Augusta was one of the early healers who drew knowledge from the Indigenous people. Black people in dentistry emphasized trailblazers such as Dr. Peter Hawkins, one of American's earliest Black dentists, and Dr. David Ferguson, founder of the National Dental Association. The contributions of Black pharmacists, nurses, and midwifery put emphasis on the indispensable roles

these professionals played, particularly in underserved communities. The Black Hospital Movement delve into the creation of facilities like the Richmond Community Hospital and Norfolk Community Hospital. In Virginia, the history of Black healthcare professionals is a story of resilience, innovation and leadership. Black Virginians have been at the forefront of healthcare for centuries as trailblazers who have influenced the healthcare system for all. The galleries' exhibitions and presentations of historical



African Americans were not only remarkable, but inspiring, and educational for all people of every age group.



A walking tour of the Jackson Ward area was comprised of information and tour of the Maggie L. Walker National Historic Site whose namesake was the first African American woman to charter a bank and serve as a bank president. The tour also involved the Richmond Historic trail of enslaved Africans, the path where enslaved Africans entered Richmond. Sister McBee who was reared on the Eastern Shore of Virginia shared that many slaves were brought to

Jamestown, and later migrated to the Eastern Shore. Richmond's First Municipal African Cemetery is on land purchased by the city in 1799 for enslaved and free Africans, and also the Lumpkin's Jail site, once known as the Devils Half Acre. The Richmond river



front was explored as well as the Historic Jackson Ward District which was once called the "Harlem of the South", a neighborhood that was a thriving center for Black entrepreneurship and culture.

All in all the tour was certainly fascinating and edifying, and offered everyone on the tour new insights and perspectives into the legacy of our Black history.

Spring Cleansing the Soul

"Create in me a clean heart, O God; and renew a right spirit within me." Psalm 51:10 KJV

The burgeoning warmth of spring draws individuals out of winter's hibernation, revealing the accumulated dust and clutter that went unnoticed in the dim light. As nature sheds its dormant layers, a corresponding urge arises to do the same within personal spaces. The vibrant energy of new growth inspires a desire for fresh starts, prompting windows to be opened and the cleansing breeze to flow in. With each blossoming bud and returning bird, a sense of renewal emerges, motivating efforts to tidy, organize, and create spaces as vibrant as the world outside.

While refreshing the physical space at the start of this new season, do not overlook the inner space—the very soul, the essence of a person. At times, spiritual life benefits from a deep cleaning as well. How can the spirit undergo a "spring-cleansing"? Drawing inspiration from seasonal housekeeping, here are a few suggestions.

- 1. Purge any old attitudes and allow yourself the freedom to move into a new season. It's easy to fall into maintaining a certain spirit continually, even if that train of thought doesn't line up with God's Word. Ask God to remove this attitude, paving the way to embrace newfound spiritual independence and move forward.
- 2. **Ask Jesus to scrub your heart clean, request forgiveness, and forgive yourself.** A sermon once spoke about keeping short accounts with God, explaining that closeness to Jesus involves not only forgiving others but also embracing personal forgiveness. How about experiencing His grace *afresh*?
- 3. **Clean out the cobwebs of negative thoughts.** Grab a rag and dust "I can't do this" and "This will never work" right out of the corner and into the trash. Discarding negative thought patterns and latching on the spiritual truths will deliver a renewed spirit. Wouldn't it be wonderful to experience a vivacious, positive thought-life?
- 4. **Take an inventory of spiritual routines.** Spruce them up as needed. Restore stale relationships by connecting and showing love again. Reach out to a friend who hasn't been seen in a while with a call or text.
- 5. **Declutter your prayer life**. Clearing away physical clutter transforms a living area into a tranquil space, and similarly, distractions that interfere with conversations with the Divine can be set aside. Choose a peaceful corner, light a candle, and allow the heart to communicate freely and openly with God, releasing worries and offering gratitude.
- 6. **Embrace the freshness of new beginnings**. Seek opportunities for personal growth. Join a Bible study group, attend a retreat, or begin a devotional journal. While adding new decor to refresh homes, consider incorporating spiritual practices that deepen faith and strengthen the connection with God.
- 7. **Reorganize your spiritual priorities.** Examine daily routines. Much like rearranging furniture to create a more functional and inviting atmosphere, consider structuring days to include moments of devotion, worship, and reflection. Placing God at the center of the schedule brings a renewed sense of purpose and direction.
- 8. **Simplify your commitments**. Just as a clean and organized home can bring a sense of peace and renewal, simplifying commitments for prioritizing time with God nourishes and restores spiritual lives.

- 9. **Brighten up your day with kindness.** Aim to be among those Christ praises for demonstrating kindness and compassion—feeding the hungry, offering water to the thirsty, welcoming strangers, providing clothing to those in need, caring for the sick, and visiting those in prison. During moments of reflection on spiritual wellbeing, consider how to further support others and foster personal spiritual growth.
- 10. **Scan for big problems you might have overlooked.** Take a moment to reflect on the Ten Commandments found in the Bible, *Exodus 20:2–17*. Consider whether any of these are not being fully lived out. If one seems to be a stumbling block, confess it and seek God's help to sweep away, or spiritually spring cleanse, the sin.

While embarking on this journey of spiritual spring cleansing, keep in mind that it is a process of ongoing renewal. 

Move With a Purpose: Exercising Outdoors vs. Indoors

MOVE WITH PURPOSE: THE BENEFITS OF EXERCISING OUTDOORS vs. INDOORS



Enjoying the beauty of the summer months is a great time to think about exercise ---- whether outside or indoors ----both can be a great benefit to your health. Regular exercise is the best way to maintain overall good health, improved our well being, and increase energy levels. Both indoor and outdoor exercise offer unique benefits – physically, mentally and spiritually.

Stepping outside to move your body is more than just a workout.

- IMPROVE MOOD AND REDUCE STRESS: Sunlight increases serotonin levels, helping you to feel more positive and calmer. Nature also has a soothing effect on the mind.
- BOOST VITAMIN D: Just 10 to 15 minutes of sun exposure a few times a week can help your body produce the vitamin D it needs for bone health and immune function.
- ENHÂNCE CREATIVITY AND MENTAL CLARITY: Time outdoors often brings a sense of renewal and perspective. Many people find that being in nature helps them to pray, reflect and reconnect with God on a deeper level.

The value of indoor exercise while less scenic offers convenience and comfort. Other benefits include some the following factors.

- YEAR-ROUND ACCESS: Rain or shine, heat or cold, the indoor setting let you keep up your routine. Exercise time can be more flexible whether you choose early morning or late evening.
- SAFE AND STRUCTURE ENVIRONMENT: Indoor facilities allow equipment and supervision to support proper form and prevent injury. Gym facilities also offers a wide range of exercise equipment and classes, promoting variety and challenge.
- COMMUNITY CONNECTION: Group fitness classes can be a great way to connect with others and enjoy the fellowship of exercising together. Also, group exercises allow you to encourage each other and stay accountable in your health commitment.

Ultimately the best choice depends on individual preferences, needs and goals. While both indoor and outdoor exercise offer physical benefits, research suggests that exercising outside in the natural environment can have the additional advantages related to mental and cognitive function and well as the physiological effects of reducing stress and promoting a more positive mood. 




Even With My Issues

Dr. Turner would hope that this book would speak to us all who believe purported untruths about ourselves and think that the issues in our lives should prevent our destined success in life. We can acknowledge that we all have issues and it is imperative that we learn to leave the guilt and shame behind and seek healing. God wants to do a new thing in our old selves, our old lives. He wants us to reach out to Him and allow Him to heal us even with our issues.

The woman with the issue of blood depicted in *Mark 5:25-34* realized that she alone could not resolve her issue and felt she could no longer live with her condition. She bravely defied her seclusion and actively sought deliverance from Jesus. We can also reach out to the Deliverer to absolve us of our infirmities. We all have secret struggles that bind us and drain us, preventing us from experiencing the abundant life God desires for us. We all have constraints that require us to seek assistance from time to time. Sometimes the only way to resolve our specific issue is to reach out to God. Some of the barriers or hindrance in our lives consist of things such as pride, poverty, fear, rebellion and even mental and physical limitations.

Issues are private, uniquely personal things that we try to hide. We try to cover them up, push them off to the side, but on our own, we do not have the strength, courage or intellect to eradicate these problems. We may waste valuable energy attempting to camouflage and deflect from our imperfections, often separating ourselves from God and others. Our issues can prevent us from true intimacy and vulnerability with God and those around us. They result in character qualities that limit us, often eliciting strong emotions, such as fear. Likewise, our issues may trigger strong emotions from others in reaction to our own self-perception and self-projection. Most issues are unwanted, challenging problems that plague us from past hurts, generational curses or bad choices we have made. Some may be the work of the enemy seeking to deter us from our intended ministries. They negatively affect our daily lives, often resulting in bondage, as we wrestle unsuccessfully to manage them in our own strength. Issues can become excuses, when rather than dealing with the issues we make detours and head further away from our hopes and dreams. Issues attract more issues and the higher the talent and potential we possess, the more likely we are to have multiple issues. They are part of a deliberate enemy strategy to keep us cowering in the dark, away from the Grace of God.

Recognizing that we have these issues can be enough to depress us, but we must understand that we can be free of the that bedevil us. Even with our concerns we are valuable to God. We are useful, even in our weakness and we can experience wholeness through the following three imperatives: **1**. **Exhausted** as we accept that we cannot heal ourselves and seek to find out where the strongholds are founded and then turn them over to Jesus, who already knows the sources and roots of our issues. **2**. **Enlightened** issues are brought into the light to be submitted to Christ to be dealt with. These are spiritual wounds and can be healed only by being exposed to the light of the Spirit of God. **3**. **Entrusted** issues must be given to Jesus to be healed. This requires humility and the willingness to surrender in order to be restored. We must accept that we are helpless outside of God's Grace through Jesus Christ.

The things I have spoken to you, that in Me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation; but be of good cheer, I have overcome the world—John 16:33


Whatever the issues that bind us, the true path to healing is the path that leads straight to Jesus Christ. Go in Peace and Run to Him!


