he faith-believing members of the Rising Mount Zion Baptist Church have many reasons to thank God for its noticeable spiritual membership growth of our church under the pastorate of the Rev. Dr. Roscoe D. Cooper III, along with the Deacon Ministry whose members are ordained to work in unison with the Pastor with all things having to do with or belonging to the spirit or soul of the church. We praise and glorify God for His great favor in growing our church membership before, during and after the era of the virus. Although there are numerous components that play a major role in the holiness of the church it is the hearing, preaching, teaching, reading, studying, and believing in God's Word that give the spiritual increase, and create and bring wholeness to every area of one's life. The majesty of God's handiwork is evident that He is definitely in control at all times and His power can replenish, reorganize, and rebuild even during tough times. Under the leadership of the Rev. Dr. Roscoe D. Cooper III, the Zion membership has risen from less than three hundred members to more than eighteen hundred. Zion, through it all, God has truly blessed this branch of Zion to gain spiritual increase, not because we are good enough, or pray enough or read the Bible enough, but rather because our Gracious God has already won the increase on our behalf! God is our Source, our Deliverer, and our Savior whom we thank for filling our spirits with His Word and love, and for the joy and privilege to gracefully nurture people's hearts toward Him, our Almighty God!

# Saying Farewell to the Old and Looking Forward to the New

The convenience of having the Rising Mount Zion Baptist Church worship services in-person and online is a blessing and offers the opportunity to reach a plethora of people. The in-person Zion Watch Night service was held on New Year's Eve, Sunday, December 31 at seven o'clock in the evening. The online congregants could view at the same time or whatever time was convenient for them.

Many of the in-person parishioners arrived early, greeted others, chose a seat, and anticipated a night of great gospel singing by the Zion Mass Choir, accompanied by musicians, and directed by Sister Amber Hughes, Choir Directress, fervent prayers offered by Associate Ministers, Rev. Rosemary Morris and Rev. Harold Sayles, and the Word of God delivered by Zion's Pastor, the Rev. Dr. Roscoe D. Cooper III.

Promptly at 7 PM, the musicians struck a musical chord, the Mass Choir members positioned themselves to begin singing, just as Pastor Cooper and the Associate Ministers entered into the sanctuary. Pausing briefly, allowing Pastor Cooper time to greet the large standing crowd and inviting them to sit. The Mass Choir almost immediately had the audience clapping, seated and/or standing, rocking and singing along with them. Rev. Morris offered a powerful and inspiring opening prayer. The song, "I am Blessed," was the prelude to the preaching of the Word of God, and touched the innermost emotions of the audience, causing them to enthusiastically join in the singing, as they praised and glorified God.

Being that New Year's Eve fell on Sunday, the morning and evening services were very well-attended. That morning, Pastor emphasized that God had blessed, kept, and highly favored us, His children, during the 2023 year. Thus, he confidently chose as his basic scripture, *I Kings 17:19*, and entitled his sermon, "Don't Doubt God Now." He stressed the following important facts: 1) Life is not a lineal journey; it has ups and downs. 2) Stay faithful to God during your difficult season. 3) Focus on the character of God. He is Omniscient, Omnipotent, and Omnipresent. 4) Never doubt God's power! Trust Him through the tough and good times. 5) God has a plan for your life. Whenever you stay in God's plan, know that all will be alright. The evening message was also inspirational, thought-provoking, and blessed. Pastor accentuated verse 37 of Romans 8, putting emphasis on the fact that Chapter 8 is filled with encouragement, hope, confidence and support. He chose as his sermon title, "Get Ready to Conquer." Pastor stated the following poignant points: a) There is no condemnation for those in Christ Jesus. b) Nothing can separate you from His love. c) You are more than conquerors. d) Whatever you face, you will be victorious. e) Your expression is more than your experience. f) 2024 will be a blessed year. Some new doors will open. g) What's ahead of you is greater than what's behind you. Thank God for the Holy Spirit that guides us in the Way of the Lord.

The evening was concluded with the choir singing, "If It Had Not Been for the Lord on My Side, Where Would I Be?" Rev. Sayles prayed a powerful and heartfelt closing prayer and Pastor Cooper offered the Benediction. Everyone departed from the services praising and thanking God, and believing that there is no condemnation at the beginning; no separation at the end; and no domination in between.

# The First Woman and First African American Librarian of Congress

The Library of Congress in Washington, D.C. is the largest library in the world with millions of books, films, videos, audios, recordings, photographs, newspapers, maps, and manuscripts and other items in its collection. The library assigns a control ID number uniquely created for each book or item in its collection. (It is noted that every book published is not listed in the Library of Congress if the information is not submitted to the Library for a unique control number). The library was originally established in 1800. The Gutenberg Bible is one of the oldest treasures owned by the Library. The Library of Congress is the unique, global institution that is a free, non-partisan service to congress, librarians, scholars, and the public in the United States and around the world. It houses the U.S. Copyright office and is the main research authority for the members of Congress and is the nation's oldest federal cultural institution employing approximately 3,000 people.

In 2016, President Barak Obama nominated *Carla D. Hayden* to serve as the 14<sup>th</sup> Librarian to lead the Library of Congress. Dr. Hayden is the first woman and first African American to serve in this capacity. Carla Diane Hayden was born in Tallahassee, Florida. Her very first position in a library was working as a Library Associate at the Chicago Public Library while also studying for her Bachelor of Arts Degree at Roosevelt University; she earned her Masters and PhD from the Graduate Library School of the University of Chicago. Dr. Hayden pursued her doctoral research in children's literature, and her dissertation focused on how museums serve children. She was an assistant professor for Library and Information Science at the University of Pittsburg. Her first leadership role was as the head of the Chicago Public Library and during that tenure she was named Librarian of the Year by the Library Journal.

In 2003 to 2004 Dr. Hayden served as the President of the American Library Association. Prior to her nomination and commission as the head of the Library of Congress, Dr. Hayden was the second African American Chief Executive of the Enoch Pratt Free Library in Baltimore, Maryland. Among many awards throughout her career, **Dr. Hayden is the 2023 recipient of the American Association Ken Haycock Award for Promoting Librarianship.** One of her favorite quotes is by Frederick Douglas, "Once you learn to read, you will be forever free."

"As a descendent of people who were denied the right to read, the opportunity to serve and lead the institution that is our national symbol of knowledge is a historic moment."

# Sean M. Ingram

Gean M. Ingram, the eldest of two children born to Deacon Marshall Ingram and Mrs. Hazel J. Ingram, grew up in Highland Springs, Virginia. He accepted Christ at an early age, was baptized, and joined the Seven Pines Baptist Church located in Sandston, Virginia, where he participated as a youth usher and sang in the youth choir.

As a student in Highland Springs High School, Sean served as the President of the Student Advisory Council, the Boys Basketball team manager, statistician, and the Battalion Commander of the Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officers Training Corps, and graduated in the Class of 1989.

After graduating from high school, Sean followed in his father's footsteps, enlisted in the United States Marine Corps, and had the opportunity to travel the world, and experience the lifestyle and culture of different ethnic people. He completed three grueling months of recruit training at Parris Island, South Carolina before being assigned to the Marine Infantry School at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina. He was then sent to Mare Island, California to attend Security Forces School, and was later assigned to Marine Detachment U.S.S. Nimitz in Bremerton, Washington.



While assigned to the Nimiz, Sean was deployed to the Persian Gulf in support of Operation Desert Storm in 1991. During his deployment, he visited the Philippines, Singapore, the United Arab Emirates, Thailand, Hong Kong, and Hawaii. Upon his return, he was assigned to the Second Battalion, Seventh Marines at Marine Base 29 Palms, California in September 1991, was promoted to the rank of Corporal and was assigned as his infantry company's Training Non-Commissioned Officer until his unit was deployed to Okinawa, Japan in August 1992. While in Okinawa, he was reassigned to the Camp Schwab Base Police Department where he served as Sergeant of the Guard. After his deployment in February of 1993, Sean decided not to reenlist and returned home to Virginia.

In 1994, Sean again followed in his father's footsteps and joined the Virginia Commonwealth University Police Department. During his 22-year career, he worked a variety of assignments



including the Patrol Division, the Special Operations Unit, the Investigative Division, and the Support Services Division. While employed by the VCU Police Department, he obtained the rank of Captain, before transferring to the Virginia State University Police Department as the Deputy Chief of Police, and earning the rank of Lieutenant Colonel for approximately 5 years before retiring in July 2021. During his career, he also worked with local agencies including the

Richmond, Henrico, Chesterfield, and the Virginia State Police Departments, the FBI, DEA, and Secret Service. He met former Presidents Barack Obama and Bill Clinton, and Qatar First Lady Moza bin Nasser Al-Missned while being assigned to their respective security teams.

Sean loves to spend time with his wife, Tanise, of 19 years, their 16-year-old daughter Aaliyah, and their15-year-old son Andre. He enjoys cooking, traveling, especially to the beach, and watching football. He frequently converses with his parents for guidance that helps him to be a better husband, father, and Christian. He also spends time talking about politics and leadership with his younger brother, Andre, who

is a Colonel in the United States Marine Corps.

In early 2013, Sean and Tanise decided to strengthen their relationship with each other and God, leading them to the Rising Mt. Zion Baptist Church where they joined under the pastorate of the Rev. Dr. Roscoe D. Cooper III. Currently, Sean serves as the head of the Zion Security Ministry; and believes "All things are possible through Christ Jesus." He and his family love being a part of the Zion church family.

# Dr. Kizzmekia S. Corbett-Helaire



#### Viral Immunologist at the forefront of developing the Moderna vaccine to combat COVID-19



izzmekia S. Corbett-Helaire, Ph.D., was the scientific lead of the Vaccine Research Center's coronavirus team at the U.S. National Institutes of Health where her investigations focused on coronavirus biology and vaccine development. Her research led to the groundbreaking discovery that a stabilized version of a spike protein which is a microscopic element that is found on the surface of all coronaviruses, would be a key target for vaccines, treatments, and diagnostics. At the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, she and her colleagues were central to the rapid development and safe and effective deployment of the Moderna (mRNA) vaccine, that has protected tens of millions worldwide. As a result of this extraordinary achievement, the Moderna vaccine is not only used in the state of Virginia and other states throughout the United States, but is also now used around the world to prevent COVID-19 disease. Her work has had a substantial impact on

ending the worst respiratory-disease pandemic in more than a hundred years.


Dr. Corbett is now an assistant professor in the Department of Immunology and Infectious Diseases at Harvard T. H. Chan School of Public Health, where she heads Harvard's Coronaviruses & Other Relevant Emerging Infectious Diseases (COREID) Lab. Its scientists study immune responses to coronaviruses and other emerging and re-emerging viruses to set in motion novel vaccine and antibody therapy development and preparedness. Alongside Moderna (mRNA-1273), a leading vaccine against the SARS-CoV-2 virus, Dr. Corbett boasts a patent portfolio which also includes influenza vaccine concepts. Though aware of ideological differences, misinformation, and partisan rancor, in her assessment as an immunologist, vaccinologist and vaccine developer, she believes vaccines to be the most effective and life-saving way to prevent covid diseases.

In addition to her research and beyond being a Harvard professor, Dr. Corbett is a vocal advocate for health equity, and uses her gift for science communication to reach out to her community with questions about vaccines. She has spoken at churches and with other community organizations, working to demystify the science of vaccines and improve confidence in the coronavirus vaccine, especially among minority populations, which have been disproportionately affected by COVID-19. Dr. Corbett embraces her visibility as a Black female scientist and encourages others to be involved in science in their communities.

Dr. Corbett has garnered a vast array of awards and recognitions along her trailblazing ascent including

the 2021 NAACP Key of Life Award. Her research and work as lead scientist on the Moderna vaccine has earned praise from President Joe Biden, Anthony S. Fauci, M.D., Former Chief Medical Advisor to the President of the United Sates. and Barney S. Graham, MD, PhD, Senior Advisor for Global Health Equity, Professor of Medicine and Microbiology, Biochemistry and Immunology, and Former Mentor to Dr. Corbett.

**VOTING** is **your civic duty** and **power.** Some elections are razor thin, making every vote the capacity to make a big difference. The theory of democracy is that it is a government for and by the people. The vote is the basic building block that gives people the power to control their government and to shape what policies they want and the future direction of their town, state, and country. In an era where information as well as misinformation is at our fingertips, it's both a privilege and responsibility to be informed, especially when it comes to our democratic processes.

Casting an informed vote is about understanding how that choice will affect your daily lives for the years to come. Voter education is the avenue that leads to such an informed decision. It's the responsibility of both the individual and the larger societal systems to ensure voters understand the candidates and ballot. Listed below are some tips on how to become more informed and some resources to help you do so:

#### THE POWER OF LOCAL ELECTIONS

- While **presidential elections** command a lot of intentions, it's the **local elections** that have the most immediate and tangible impact on our daily lives.
- Each ballot carries tremendous power and more significant weight since fewer voters turn out to vote in their local elections. Each vote offers an opportunity for individuals to influence their immediate surroundings and advocate for the issues that matter most to them.
- Elected officials at the local level, such as Governorships, Mayors, Supervisors, City Councilmen, School Board Representatives, etc. shape policies on everything from public transportation to local taxes, to educational reforms and more...

#### WHERE TO FIND RESOURCES

- Find out if your state offers an **APP** for voting. APPS can offer access to the upcoming ballot, tell you where to vote, help you update your registration, vote by absentee ballot, etc.
- Your **local newspapers** and **community websites** offer reliable information.
- Vote 411 offers a comprehensive look at the ballot, from top offices to the local issues and provides insight on measures and candidate viewpoints or opinions.
- **Ballotpedia** serves as an objective online encyclopedia of neutral, detailed information about elections at all levels.

#### INTERPRETING THE BALLOT

- To get the true meaning and implications of these measures, voters should turn to nonpartisan resources like the ones indicated above or attend local community forums that offer clear and concise explanations.
- Additionally, it is beneficial to check candidate's official websites and social media pages.

#### ENGAGE WITH LOCAL OFFICIALS

- Local officials tend to be more accessible (easier to reach) and responsive to their constituents.
- You can send an email or make a phone call if there's a question about a candidate's opinion on an

issue.

- Direct engagement provides valuable insights and informs officials about the issues that matter to their community.
- Also, attending town hall meetings or public forums hosted in local community centers, schools, or libraries offers a direct channel to engage with and learn from candidates.

#### MAKE SURE YOU ARE REGISTERED TO VOTE

- Make certain that your right to vote has not been taken away under the *Discriminatory Voters ID laws*--has not been purged or removed.
- Know that purging voter rolls is a necessary and important process.
- Registered voters can be removed for a number of reasons, including *death, moving, committing a felony*, among others.
- Once your record is purged, you become ineligible to cast your ballot.
- Check to make sure your registration is active before the **November 5, 2024 election**.

#### **NOW IT'S TIME TO VOTE**

- A thriving democracy relies on the active and informed participation of its citizens.
- Understanding the democratic processes, the candidates and the issues, make you become an integral part of shaping your community's and nation's future direction.
- Prepare to exercise that power in every Local and General Election!

#### ADDITIONAL HELPFUL INFORMATION

- Virginia is an open primary state with nonpartisan registration which means anyone once registered, can vote in a primary election regardless of their party affiliation. However, voters can only cast one ballot per primary election which means they CANNOT vote in the Republican and Democratic primary during the same contest.
- Voters should register or update their registration by October 15, 2024.
- Deadline to apply to receive a ballot by mail is October 25, 2024. Send in mailing ballots early.
- Early in-person voting starts on October 26, 2024, and the last day of in-person early voting is November 2, 2024. Take advantage of early voting.

### Election Day is Tuesday, November 5, 2024.







### Beyond the Brush: Nurturing Oral Health for a Healthier, Happier You

Good oral health is linked to the health of the whole body. The mouth is the gateway into your body and any bacteria from your mouth can travel to other parts of your body and put you at risk for other health conditions.

Research shows that infection in the gum or gingivitis and inflammation or infection in the root of the teeth and surrounding gum crevices or periodontitis can contribute to certain health conditions. These health conditions include cardiovascular disease, stroke, pneumonia, endocarditis which is infection of the lining of the heart and pregnancy complications. Person diagnosed with periodontal disease are twice as likely to be diagnosed with heart disease that is caused by plaque and bacteria that enters the body from the gums. Bacteria from your mouth can also travel by the blood stream and cause infection in the lungs causing a greater risk of suffering from bronchitis and pneumonia or to your heart causing endocarditis. Good oral hygiene helps to prevent tooth decay and cavities which increase these harmful bacteria. Good oral hygiene also helps to prevent bad breath caused by bacteria in your mouth. Routine oral exams can detect gum disease early when it may be reversible with treatment and detect oral lesions which may be the cause of oral cancer.

The important steps to maintain good oral hygiene to help prevent these health problems:

- Brush your teeth at least twice a day. Be sure to brush all the teeth surfaces, including the back and sides of the teeth.
- Floss once daily. It allows you to reach between the teeth where brushing alone cannot reach.
- Brush your tongue. Your tongue holds bacteria like a sponge. You can use your toothbrush or a special tongue scraper.
- Use an antibacterial mouthwash every day. This helps to rid your mouth of harmful oral bacteria and helps to reduce plaque buildup.
- Visit your dentist regularly for routine dental exams and cleaning. The general recommendation for dental visits is every 6 months.
- Change your toothbrush every 3 months. It is about this time that the bristle on the brush began to breakdown and are less effective with brushing.
- Avoid smoking and other tobacco and smoking products. Smoking is the leading cause of gum disease and oral cancer.







Good oral health is important to your overall health. Eating a healthy balanced diet and limiting added sugar are also important in maintaining good care of your teeth.

# Simone Arianne Biles



#### The most decorated American gymnast, with 24+ Olympic & World Championship medals

Being an athlete in my younger years had an impact on my choice of an outstanding Black Woman athlete during Black History Month. - Mary T. Kemp

Simone Arianne Biles was born March 14, 1997 in Columbus, Ohio. However, she grew up in Spring, Texas, in the Houston metropolitan area, after she and her sister were adopted by her grandparents, Ronald and Nellie Biles. Simone became interested in gymnastics at age 6 during a day care field trip to Bannon's Gymnastrix, and remained there for eleven years.

She rose to fame in 2013, winning two World Championships golds at age 16, including the allaround title. The world renown gymnast followed that with four World golds in 2014 and another **four** in 2015.

By the time her first Olympics rolled around in Rio 2016, she was already a superstar and the fieriest of hot favorites for the titles. She didn't disappoint, winning Bronze - Balance Beam, four Golds - Floor Exercise, Horse Vault, Individual All-around, and Team All-around. It was her sixth time winning Individual All-around Title.

Simone made history in 2019, becoming the first gymnast in more than six decades to win **five** gold medals. Due to COVID, no major events were held in 2020. At the 2021 U.S. Classic she became the first female gymnast to land the sports most difficult vault, the Yurchenko double pike, during a competition. Later that year she captured her **seventh** all-around title and won three gold medals and one bronze.

The Tokyo games were delayed until 2021. However, Biles withdrew from most events due to "the twisties," a mental block in which gymnasts lose their spatial orientation during aerial moves. Her decision not to compete sparked discussion about the pressure placed on athletes and their mental health. She returned for the final event, the balance beam, and won a bronze medal.

Simone had a stellar return to the 2023 Artistic Gymnastics World Championship in Antwerp, Belgium, setting several records, becoming the most decorated gymnast of all time, and further cementing her title as the "GOAT" (Greatest Of All Times) of Gymnastics. She ended the year with the most world medals (30), most combined world and Olympic medals (37), most world all-around (6) in Women's 2013-2015, 2018, 2019, and 2023. She was the first woman to land the Yurchenko double pike vault, now known as the Biles II. Simone wed Jonathan Owens, a Green Bay Packers defensive back on April 22, 2023.



# Jennifer L. McClellan



# First Black Woman Elected to Congress from Virginia

ennifer Leigh McClellan was born December 28, 1972 in Petersburg, Virginia. Jennifer's mother, Lois, grew up in the segregated South and did not get to vote until she was in her 30's after the Voting Rights Act was passed in 1965. Both her mother and father, James F. McClellan, worked at Virginia State University.

Jennifer graduated from Matoaca High School as the valedictorian of her class. She earned a Bachelor of Arts in English and Political Science from the University of Richmond in 1994. In 1997, she graduated from the University of Virginia School of Law. After law school, she practiced law at Hunton & Williams and worked as a regulatory counsel for Verizon Communications.

Jennifer began her political career in the Virginia House of Delegates from 2006-2017 where she represented the 71<sup>st</sup> District, which includes parts of the city of Richmond and Henrico County. While in the General Assembly, she became Vice Chairwoman of the Virginia Legislative Black Caucus and became the first pregnant Virginia delegate to participate in a legislative session. From 2017-2023, she was a member of the Virginia Senate from the 9<sup>th</sup> District. McClellan co-sponsored the Repeal Act which would have lifted some of Virginia's restrictions on abortion. McClellan ran for Governor in 2021 but lost to Terry McAuliffe in the Democratic primary election. Upon the passing of Representative Donald McEachin in 2023, she sought to fill his seat in the special general election for the U.S. House Virginia District 4. Jennifer defeated the Republican candidate Leon Benjamin with 74% of the vote. Jennifer's mother, at the age 90, got a chance to vote for her daughter who would become the first black woman elected to Congress from Virginia. Jennifer assumed office on March 7, 2023. In Congress, she sits on the House Armed Services Committee and the House Science, Space, and Technology Committee. Her current term will end on January 3, 2025.

Jennifer married David Mills in 2008. Her mentor, Tim Kaine, officiated the wedding ceremony. She lives in Richmond with her husband and two children.











# RMZBC Ash Wednesday

This year Ash Wednesday fell on February 14 which was also Valentine's Day. However, Ash Wednesday is a movable date, always in the month of February or March, the first day of the Lenten season, and a 40-day countdown to Easter/Resurrection Sunday. It awakens Christ-believers to Jesus' entry into the desert preceding His death. Before Easter/Resurrection Sunday, we must prepare our hearts for His Resurrection. Our season of preparing our hearts for Resurrection begins by recognizing our brokenness and a need for us to turn our hearts to God. Also, it is a period to focus on sacrament preparation, a new habit, volunteering, studying, serving, and loving God and others. Accordingly, we can understand the magnificence of God's Love for us as He humbled Himself and gave His Life on the Cross that we might receive the gift of Eternal Glory with Him. The most essential part of the day is that it makes one feel closer to Christ, and reminds him/her of the true meaning of Easter/the Resurrection season.

During the Imposition of Ashes Service, the ashes that are placed on parishioners' forehead in the shape of a cross symbolize our mortality and are a physical reminder that our bodies will decay but our souls will live on in eternal life. It is a corporal signal of worshipers' sign of humility, mortality, sinfulness, repentance, and a need to ask forgiveness from God. The custom qualifies the memory of Christians that we are *dust and to dust we shall return*. It describes our human condition that we are broken and need repair, and that we are ultimately sinners and need redemption. As followers of Jesus, we are to examine our faith, deepen our commitment to live a Christ-like lifestyle, and carry our crosses.

Pastor Roscoe D. Cooper III reverently greeted the believers and asked Rev. Harold Sayles to offer prayer, followed by Deacon Mary Kemp who shared the principle purpose of the Lenten season. The ambiance of the seamless hour-long service was blessed as Pastor spoke the words of the opening selection, "I Am Thine, O Lord," while the audience sang the words.

Remaining at the sacred podium, Pastor invoked God's presence through prayer, chose his principle scripture, *Proverbs 4:23*, and entitled his sermon, *Your Heart Matters.* Some of his poignant points stated that we should: 1) Reflect on our self, our attitude, and our actions, and see ourselves as we truly are. 2) Put aside our faults, wrongs, and short comings, by reconnecting to God through prayer. 3) Start and finish your resolution so that it permanently impacts your relationship with God. 4) Draw closer to God who keeps, holds, heals, and makes a way for us to persevere and grow. 5) Fix our eyes on God's glory, goodness, and greatness. 6) Know that matters of the heart bring joy, tears, peace, and connects us to God and each other. 7) Don't allow dirt/dust to accumulate in your heart, but rather cleanse it by repenting, confessing to God, and allowing it to flow strongly and be washed by the Word of God. 8) Guard your heart with diligence, be obedient to the Word of God, and pray about everything. 9) Thank God, focus on Him and know that Lent is a season of peace, hope and love. As a body of Christ followers, we must let our Lenten season help us to be more intimate with God, meditate, read, study more, focus on our spiritual reflection and cleansing, and know that we are resilient people who have victoriously journeyed through many trials.

At the conclusion of the service, each congregant received a cross of ashes on his forehead that was administered by Pastor Cooper and assisted by Zion Associate Ministers, Rev. Rosemary Morris and Rev. Sayles. At the completion of the Imposition of ashes, only Pastor Cooper's prayer/Benediction was orally spoken, asking God to create in each of us a pure heart and renew within us a steadfast spirit. The audience silently and obediently departed the sanctuary, feeling spiritually recharged and blessed! What a POWERFUL and INSPIRING evening!
