The Preamble to the Zion Celebration of Resurrection Sunday

The Rising Mount Zion Baptist Church observed Holy Week, a week of more fervent prayer, study, and repentance, that commenced on Palm Sunday, April 2. Pastor Cooper chose to employ Matthew 21:1-3 as his pivotal scripture and entitled his sermon, "Run Tell That." He emphasized the correlation between the four gospels, Matthew, Mark, Luke, John, and how each of the authors wrote about the *Preaching*, *Power*, Persecution and Passion of Jesus Christ. In the four gospels, Jesus' desire is to Do His Father's Will and Fulfill the *Prophecy.* Purposefully, He rode into Jerusalem on a donkey--a symbol of peace/humbleness and the only animal with the symbol of a cross on its back, and to give, the body of believers, peace. We glorify Jesus Christ who died on the Cross, offering *His Blood* for • the forgiveness of our sins. Each congregant received a palm as he left the sanctuary and was asked to wave it and say, "Ride on King Jesus." It was heartwarming to see so many persons smiling and following directions! When Jesus Rides in, something has to **Ride out!**



Maundy Thursday commemorates the Last Supper and a Day of Prayer. Good Friday, April 7, was hosted by the First African Baptist Church – Senior Pastor, Dr. Rodney Waller. Seven guest ministers were invited to give a seven-minute sermonette on the

seven last words Jesus spoke before His crucifixion. Pastor

Cooper was the third minister, utilizing the key scripture reading, *John 19:25*, and entitling his sermonette, "Woman, Behold Thy Son." Pastor emphasized that in this periscope, the deity of Jesus is both divine and human and He is cognizant of all our needs. With clarity, Pastor identified three poignant facts: 1) Jesus met the needs. 2) Faith matured. 3) There is power inside a Dying Man. Jesus gave hope—Good Friday was dark, gloomy, but early

Believers know that Jesus is the "Real Thing;" He can be trusted with all things, and via His sovereign sacrifices, He conquered our sins, death, the grave and Satan! Hallelujah He has risen; and because He lives, we can face tomorrow...



Cooper III hosted the Henrico Ministers' Conference & Vicinity County-Wide Revival on Monday and Tuesday evenings, April 17 – 18. Zion's Mass Choir, directed by Amber Hughes and accompanied by its musicians provided the music, and a great number of Zion ushers readily served. The Rev. Zynora D. Manson, President of the Henrico Ministers' Conference & Vicinity and Associate Minister – Seven Pines Baptist Church greeted the audience each night. Also, a plethora of HMCV clergy and guest clergy ministered or served as participants on the program. On Monday night, the Rev. Tyrone Nelson, Pastor of the sixth Mt. Zion Baptist Church and the Varina District Supervisor, and the host Pastor, the Rev. Dr. Roscoe Cooper III and the Fairfield District School Board representative, were the duo spiritual messengers of the evening.

Rev. Nelson delivered the first sermon, utilizing the scriptural reading, Genesis 48:17-19, and naming his

sermon, *God Knows What God Is Doing.* His focal points were: 1) God will always bless the right person even if He has to cross His hands to do so. 2) Can you praise God for the blessing you receive although you and others may think you deserve the gift someone else has received? 3) God knows our destiny; and everybody's destiny is not the same. 4) Trust God and keep your faith deeply anchored in the Lord. 5) Thank God for the blessing you receive. After a brief prayer, **Pastor Cooper** immediately chose his pivotal scripture, *1 Kings 19:4*, and

entitled his Word from God, "Enough Is Enough." Pastor painted the state of Elijah who had been zealous for the Lord God. Because the Israelites had rejected the Lord's covenant, torn down the His altars, and killed the prophets, and being the only one left, Elijah ran for his life because he was afraid, exhausted, and ready to throw in the towel--to give up. When he came to a broom bush, he sat down under it and prayed that he might die because he was brainfatigued and had had enough of the encounters with the Israelites. He fell asleep under the bush and was awaken twice by an angel of the Lord who told him to "Get up and eat." After a warm greeting, Dr. Kenney chose his principal scripture, *Matthew 28:11-15* and entitled his sermon, "Sitting on a Throne of Lies." Centuries later, the lie still lives. The Consequences of Pangerous Priving

Since more drivers are on the roadways than ever before, it is essential that all drivers use every precaution possible to avoid adding to the already increasing roadway traffic accidents. All schools will soon be out for the summer, a situation that may increase the number of drivers on the highway, especially younger drivers. It should be noted that it's not just the younger drivers who are causing accidents, and too often fatal ones, on the roadways. ALL drivers are responsible! Parents, teachers, and other adults must set good example for younger drivers, encourage and expect safe-driving, and respect other drivers.

A survey by the AAA Foundation for Traffic safety showed that dangerous driving behaviors rose in 2022, escalating the risk to everyone on the roadways. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) estimated that there were almost 43,000 traffic fatalities due to motor-vehicle traffic crashes in 2021, an increase of more than 10 percent from the year before. According to NHTSA, dangerous driving behaviors such as speeding, alcohol impairment, and non-use of seatbelts account for a considerable proportion of the rise in deaths. The report mirrors the foundation findings.

To help protect everyone who shares the roadways, motorists are urged to keep the following safety tips foremost in mind:

- Eliminate phone distractions. Stow your smartphone away, turn it to airplane mode, or activate call/text blocking features like Apple's Do Not Disturb.
- **Slow down.** Drivers tend to overestimate the time saved by speeding. Remember that excessive speed could result in the loss of life or a lifetime disability.
- Stay alert. Stop driving if you become tired because you can fall asleep at any time. Fatigue impacts reaction time, judgment and vision.
- **Drive sober.** If you consume marijuana or alcohol, don't drive. If you are taking potentially impairing prescription medications, discuss with your doctor or pharmacist how best to stay safe and healthy behind the wheel.
- Buckle your seatbelt for every ride. It does not matter where in the vehicle you are seated: a properly worn seatbelt is the most effective way to survive a traffic crash.
- Move over for cyclists and pedestrians on the roadways. If there are no bike lanes on the road ways, drivers should move over at least three feet. If another vehicle is approaching driving on a two-lane roadway going in the opposite direction, stop and allow the vehicle to pass, and go safely around the cyclist or pedestrian.
- Merge onto traffic correctly. There's a science to emerging in traffic that is supposed to stream organically. Take your turn when it arrives and proceed slowly.
- Turn on your lights. When driving in the dark, turn on your lights. Remember the rule WIPERS ON- LIGHTS ON!

AVOID THE FOLLOWING BAD DRIVING HABITS:

Don't cut cars off. Although it may be tempting to weave in and out of traffic to make progress if you are stuck behind a slow driver when you are late for work or an appointment, don't risk the chance.

- 1. Don't disregard traffic signs. Stop signs are meant for drivers to stop fully and yield to other road users when they come to a "yield" sign. Don't go around or pass a-stopped school buses loading or unloading students or risk beating a train when the gate is coming down or already down.
- 2. Don't accelerate on yellow. Don't speed up as you approach the lights if you see green switch to yellow or yellow becoming red. It can cause a horrendous accident in the intersection for you and the green-lighted driver coming from the opposite direction. Or, you may risk getting a traffic ticket.
- **3. Don't ignore blind spots.** Blind spots are dangerous but failing to check them can cause a serious accident. Before signaling to change lanes, always check your side mirror and glance over your shoulder in case there's a vehicle hiding in the blind spot of your mirror.
- **4. Don't rubber neck.** Slowing down to look at a crash can be unsafe. Keep your eyes on the road ahead and look out for closed lanes, obstacles on the road, emergency vehicles or police directing traffic
- 5. Don't drive with worn tires. You may be able to drive with bald tires in dry weather but worn tires won't give you the grip you need on wet roads and could cause your car to hydroplane. Let the pros rebalance your tires and tell you when you need new ones.
- **6. Don't park illegally.** No matter how scarce parking spots are, avoid parking in bus stops, disabled-only spaces, red zones, or double-park. Parking illegally can put others in a dangerous situation and garner you an expensive ticket.
- 7. Secure loose cargo properly. Rolling objects can get stuck under the pedals making them inoperable, which can be deadly. Piled up equipment or boxes on the back seat can block your rear-view vision. Loose heavy or sharp items loaded on the top of your vehicle can turn into projectiles if not secured properly; you have to brake suddenly or get involved in an accident.

Make a commitment to correct any bad driving habits you have and get behind the wheel with confidence, knowing you are a good and careful driver!

The Difference between MEMORIAL Day & VETERANS Day

On both Memorial Day and Veterans Day, it's customary to spend time remembering and honoring the countless veterans who have served the United States throughout the country's history. However, there's a distinction between the two holidays.

- **Memorial Day** commemorates the men and women who **died** while serving in the United States Armed Forces, particularly those who died in battle or as a result of wounds sustained in battle. In other words, the purpose of Memorial Day is to memorialize the veterans who made the **ultimate** sacrifice for their country.
- Some veterans find it dismaying when they are thanked on this day. It's a time remembering those who lost their lives and could not come home.
- Perhaps, we can support and safeguard their grieving families and loved ones who are left behind, as well as reflecting on why we, the living, have luxury and freedom that we enjoy today.
- Memorial Day is observed on the last Monday of May. This year Memorial Day was observed on May 29.
- **Veterans Day** is the day set aside to thank and honor **ALL** who served in the United States Armed Forces in wartime and peacetime---regardless of whether they died or survived.
- Veterans Day is always observed officially on **November 11**, regardless of the day of the week on which it falls.

FLYING OLD GLORY

- Flag etiquette on Memorial Day is unique. At sunrise, flags are to be raised to full staff briskly, then lowered to half-staff position where they remain until noon.
- Traditionally, on Memorial Day (U.S.), veterans often place small American flags on each grave site at national cemeteries. A national moment of remembrance takes place at 3:00 p.m. local time.

Mask-Wearing Data

Many believers and non-believers alike may have heard on Friday May 5, 2023 that the World Health Organization (WHO) released a statement that COVID19 no longer qualifies as a global emergency, marking a symbolic end to the devastating coronavirus pandemic. Previous to this release President Biden had announced in January 2023 that the COVID19 National Public Health Emergency Declaration would expire on May 11, 2023 which has provided coverage, cost and payment for Covid 19 testing, treatment and vaccines, and outlined other regulatory provisions made in response to the Covid 19 crisis.

It has been more than three years since the WHO had initially declared Covid19 an international crisis causing our society to be shut down for months. The United States saw the deadliest outbreak of all countries in the world where more than one million people have died as a result of this virus.

The downgrade by the WHO comes about now due to the pandemic being on a downward trend over the past year with a decrease in covid related illness and covid associated hospital admissions and deaths. The COVID death rate has slowed from a peak of more than 100,000 persons per week in January 2021 to just over 3500 persons in the week of April 24, 2023. This decline is reflective of widespread vaccinations, the availability of better testing and treatment and a level of immunity in the population from prior infections.

Based on the WHO statement and the current downward trend with the Covid19 numbers, MASKS will be OPTIONAL during SUNDAY WORSHIP SERVICES and ALL OTHER ACTIVITIES HELD ON THE RMZ CHURCH CAMPUS EFFECTIVE MAY 14, 2023. Persons may still feel free to choose to wear a mask if they so desire. PLEASE REMEMBER IF YOU ARE SICK OR IF YOU TEST POSITIVE FOR COVID19 TO JOIN US **ONLINE OR ON FACEBOOK**.

Over the past three years, our church has effectively implemented the guidelines that were recommended by the CDC during the peak of this pandemic. The masks requirements, hand sanitizer stations, and the sanctuary being sanitized with an appropriate mist-spray after each service were just some of the ways the church kept up with the recommendations. Some of these safety measures will continue to be available such as the sanitizer stations; and the RMZ custodians will continue to sanitize areas within the church frequented by people. This decision will be re-visited in a couple of months. We, the Zion body of believers, are grateful to God that we are now able to come to this milestone where we can readily transition from these requirements. Thank you to our members and friends for your patience and your diligence in following our protocols during these pandemic months.

THE BATTLE IS NOT OVER!

Be mindful that infectious disease experts believe that no one should take this to mean that this virus is gone or is no longer a problem. Covid19 virus will still be a significant concern for the health care system. For persons who are considered to be high risk based on medical conditions, over the age of 65 or have an immunocompromised condition, masks should still be worn for protection.

The Honorable Hakeem Sekou Jeffries

The *Honorable Hakeem Jeffries* of the Eighth Congressional District of New York is the Democratic Leader of the United States House of Representatives, having been unanimously elected to that position by his colleagues in November 2022. In that capacity, he is the highest-ranking Democrat in the House of Representatives and the first Black lawmaker to lead a Congressional Party. His first official speech as House Minority Leader was remarkable. Though given in the wee hours of the morning, the congressman captivated his audience in the chamber and online with a clever and unique alphabetical iteration of Democratic Party values.

According to the congressman, "The political process is rough and tumble by definition, and being grounded in faith in a Higher Power has proven helpful in navigating the difficult terrain." He describes his political brand as a reasonable, common-sense, tough, get-stuff-done Democrat. Diplomatically, he acknowledges that his upbringing and career choices formed the foundation for his center-left political identity, heightened sensitivity to racial and pocketbook issues and exceedingly deliberative approach. Among his colleagues in Congress, Congressman Jeffries is known as a calm and self-disciplined operator. Under his leadership House Democrats will endeavor to work in a bipartisan fashion where possible and stand up to extremism from the other side of the aisle wherever and whenever necessary.

Representative Jeffries is the former Chair of the Democratic Caucus, Whip of the Congressional Black Caucus and co-chair of the Democratic Policy and Communications Committee where he helped develop the For The People agenda. In Congress, Mr. Jeffries is a tireless champion for social and economic justice. He has worked diligently to help citizens recover from the devastation of the COVID-19 pandemic, reform our criminal justice system, improve the economy for everyday Americans and protect our healthcare from right-wing attacks. Furthermore, he has been instrumental in House Democratic efforts to put people over politics by lowering costs, creating better-paying jobs and fighting for safer communities. Leader Jeffries and his party have passed legislation supporting the agenda including the American Rescue Plan, the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, the Bipartisan Safer Communities Act, the CHIPS and Science Act and the Inflation Reduction Act. In addition to this great work, Representative Jeffries was one of seven House Impeachment Managers for the first Senate trial that indicted the former President of the United States, and was the first African American man to serve in that capacity. Like House Minority Leader Hakeem Jeffries, the Democrats in the House of Representatives understand that the "D" in Democrat stands for DELIVER, and they are determined to always do the right thing in the interests of the American people!



How to Human

Three Ways to Share Life Beyond What Distracts, Divides, and Disconnects Us By Carlos Whittaker

The author introduces us to the text by relaying an incident that occurred when he was young. He and his mother were at a barber shop at a shopping mall in Decatur, Georgia. While in the midst of having his smooth Afro groomed, a commotion ensued outside the window of the shop. Unbeknown to them at the time, it involved an attempted child abduction. The barber dropped his trimmers immediately and ran, along with others, to assist the mother in pursuit of the perpetrator. Those in pursuit were successful in thwarting the abduction, thankfully. The premise of this example was that the people around immediately reacted to the imminent threat at hand. They didn't have a meeting or a conference to decide how to proceed. They didn't stop to think if the mother and her child were like them, looked like them, talked, voted or worshiped like them. They came together to do the right thing in the moment. They ran and caught up to and retrieved the child that was in danger. This is what humans were created to do; to instinctively help others, to band together, to reach out for the betterment of humankind. We each possess the desire to do good, although we might find that hard to believe about some within our midst. Those we wonder about have that innate desire within them as well.

We are all created in the image of God. However, it seems that the year 2020 has "jacked up' our sense of humanity as a result of the Covid 19 pandemic, isolation, ugly politics and protests. Consequently, it may require a reset or recalibration to get back to who we once were or who we are meant to be. Many of us may have gotten off course and are having difficulty finding our equilibrium. We must figure out what is required to get back on the paths we were detoured away from. We must get back to standing together in difficult times to assist our fellow humans whenever necessary.

The author tells us that it must begin with us. We must **Be, See and Free**. We must strive to come alive, back to what God intended us to become. God calls for us to be human; to come from under the buried traumas, trials and triggers derived from years of being surrounded by people who look like us, think like us, talk like us. We need to get back to who we were before the opinions, ideals of others and life events shaped us and changed us from who we were meant to be. Many of us have allowed the vicissitudes of life to change us from the original version of ourselves. Our stress, fear, pain and divisiveness may have distracted us from our paths and the purpose that God preordained for us. We must reclaim our inner compass and regain our bearings, for in the midst of the recent, continuous turmoil of our times, along with our own busyness, we have forgotten how to be. Only when we can discover/rediscover who we are, will we be able to serve other people.

<u>Be you</u> is what we are told. When we know who we are and where we came from, we can better equip ourselves for where we are going, for what lies await in our futures. If we discover what brings us joy, we can come alive and cultivate the kind of life we were intended to live.

<u>Be love</u>. We must love one another as Christ loves us and as He commands in John 15:12. We should show love to others in simple ways, which will enhance their faith in humanity and ours as well.

<u>Be compassion.</u> Show others *empathy*, as well as *sympathy*, when there is a need for it. Empathy will resonate deeply with one who is suffering grief or misfortune. "Everyone needs compassion, a love that's never failing." The purest compassion streams from persons enduring pain and/or hardship in their own lives who have the capacity to extend compassion to others. True compassion is evident when it can be felt without judgment outside of the confines of our inner circles, to others with different beliefs and lifestyles.

Be justice. Jesus and justice go hand in hand. Jesus walked the earth for the purpose of <u>all lives</u>. He was indiscriminate in His fight for justice for *all* people. Jesus spoke truth and stood up for the marginalized people over and over. We are also called to use our "justice muscle" to help build bridges for those who are in need of advocacy and support.

<u>Be wonder</u>. It is suggested that we return to a simpler way of life. Although technology has added much convenience, ease and speed in many aspects, we have lost the sense of wonder and exploration. If we slow down, notice the beauty and wonders of nature, we may find that God's Speed feels so much more human.

<u>See humans.</u> All of us are desperate to be seen for who we are and what we are. To see someone does not mean we have to agree with them, but hopefully, we can begin to care about them. We may be able to see others not just with our eyes, but also with our heads and through our souls. We may then establish a measure of clarity.

<u>See bias</u>. We should recognize that it exists in others and also in ourselves. Although we cannot call the bias out of ourselves, we must confront it. There are times when our bias does not match our reality. Ideally, when we get to know others through shared experiences, we may begin to eradicate some of the bias we feel. We may begin to see people for who they are, rather than who we believe them to be. Negative bias toward us may also be diminished.

<u>See closer</u>. The closer we become involved with others, to know them better, the more clarity we might find for the specific bias they project. Seeing others clearly is not always easy, but it is what is required to course-correct humanity.

<u>See to serve</u>. Jesus came that He might serve others and we are expected to do likewise. We can do so by monetary or other donations, helping to feed the hungry and volunteering our skills and talents.

<u>See clearly</u>. We should attempt to close the gap with those we desire relationship with. Try to make time for meaningful exchange or contact. We should seek opportunities to be near to others.

<u>See journeys</u>. Like Jesus, we can see the ugliness, the struggles, the bad decisions of the people in our lives and still look at them as human. We can walk with these people and offer them a semblance of grace, letting them know they are seen. Our seeing them may be freeing, prompting them to self-correct and heal.

Free human. The author suggests that we should find others who need help in discovering freedom. Some of the unrest in our society is the result of humans feeling imprisoned by invisibility. Rioters, looters and insurrectionists are expressing the language of the unheard. So as humans we need to find ways to help others find freedom before they make devastating decisions that affect the masses. We must use our influences to help others heal. It will require a **revival** of humanity, humans being, seeing and freeing. When we can have a discussion and realize that listening to an opposing point of view does not diminish our own viewpoint, it may lead to freedom for all involved in the conversation. Listening may allow for a degree of compromise.

<u>Free loneliness</u>. We should allow the compassion inside of us to touch others; to get close enough to free someone from loneliness, suffering and bondage. We should touch their stories, up close and personal and help to heal them.

<u>Free life</u>. If we do small deeds of kindness to lift others' spirits, we may prompt freedom for them and in the process, free ourselves.

<u>Free me</u>. We cannot possibly free others until we find freedom for ourselves. We can begin by reaching out to someone whom we may have been at odds with to try to breathe life into them and seek to see a situation as they do.

Free indeed. We may not always know how to achieve the freedom we seek. It can be elusive.


<u>Free extravagantly</u>. When we give extravagantly, we free more rapidly. Finding it in our guts to give as much as we can, we risk ourselves to rescue others.

<u>Free empathy</u>. It is important that we get better at feeling *with* others, as well as feeling *for* them. We need to share with others in their pain, with honest connection. We should listen more, to understand in more human ways. That is how we human. We see humans, we strive to free humans by being human—**BE**, **SEE** and **FREE**.
